Dear Parents and Carers

Students in Year 7 have this week been treated to an excellent History trip to Bodiam Castle to support their learning about the Norman Conquest and development of castles. Year 11 have also continued on their journey towards success, completing their Dance practical assessments, before final Photography and Art exams next week. We continue to be impressed by their attitude and openness to support. Next Wednesday evening we also have our Spring Music Concert (please see attached flyer) and look forward to welcoming in as many of you as possible for this - Mr Williams and the team continue to raise the profile of Music and we are proud of all of the work being done across our arts subjects to broaden students' experience and give them the most balanced curriculum.

This week I received an email from a member of the 1955 class of the old Grammar School at Windmill Lane, notifying us of a planned 70th anniversary reunion. The author, John Ayling, is keen to reconnect with old friends and asked me to share this with our families. If anyone in our community knows anyone who was part of this 1955 cohort and would like to join this reunion, it is planned for Sunday 9th November and will most likely take place at The Felbridge Hotel. Mr Fallick has written to you this year to explain the impact of school attendance and our aims to improve this to support student success. Last week a report was released by the DFE (https://assets.publishing.service.gov.uk/media/67c96d7dd0fba2f1334cf2ed/The_link_between_a tendance_and_attainment_in_an_assessment_year - March_2025.pdf) that made an explicit causal link between good attendance and good outcomes for students at Key Stage 4. The authors found that students who attended nearly every day in Year 11 (95-100% attendance) were 1.9 times more likely to achieve a Grade 5 in English and Maths GCSE compared to those with 90-95% attendance (up to 2 weeks or more of absence in a school year). This means that missing 10 days of Year 11 reduced the likelihood of achieving a Grade 5 in English and Maths by 50%. It also found that students in the 90-95% bracket were 1.6 times more likely than those with 85-90% attendance to achieve a Grade 5 in English and Maths. We obviously understand that there are times when it would not be right for students to be in school if they are too unwell, but this research reinforces our view that we can have the most impact in supporting students to achieve the best possible outcomes if they are in front of us in school.

We have Year 12 Consultation Evening on Thursday of next week, which will be an important opportunity for parents and carers to understand fully how students have managed the transition and progression into Level 3 courses. A reminder that this means there will be an early closure at 2.30pm. Travel arrangements for our early closure are as follows for students who catch school coaches/buses and taxis:

On Monday of this week Charlie stopped to help an elderly lady who had fallen in the park. He stayed with her awaiting an ambulance, arranged for a blanket to keep her warm, followed the instructions of the ambulance call handler, supported the handover to the paramedics when they arrived and ensured she went off safely in the ambulance. We are incredibly proud of Charlie's actions, showing such compassion and maturity in managing an incredibly difficult situation in a busy park.
